





DementiaHere are some symptoms to watch for.

1. Difficulty with everyday tasks. Everyone makes mistakes, but people with dementia may find it increasingly difficult to do things like keep track of monthly bills or follow a recipe while cooking, the Alzheimer's Association says. They may also find it hard to concentrate on tasks, take much longer to do them or have trouble finishing them.

2. Repetition. Asking a question over and over or telling the same story about a recent event multiple times are common indicators of mild or moderate Alzheimer's, according to the Cleveland Clinic.

3. Communication problems. Observe if a loved one has trouble joining in conversations or following along with them, stops abruptly in the middle of a thought, or struggles to think of words or the name of objects

Getting lost. People with dementia may have difficulty with visual and spatial abilities. That can manifest itself in problems like getting lost while driving, according to the Mayo Clinic.

5. Personality changes. A loved one who



Coach Eakin -OGSA

In 1977, when Dan Eakin moved to Olathe with his family—wife and four daughters—OGSA was still at the embryo stage. It was in 1979 that Mr. Eakin ad, and became coach for a girl's softball team sponsored by Duguid-Haynes In-

surance Agency. The uniform for that team was blue jeans and a team shirt. Thanks to Eldon Miller they were able to use two fields at the State School for the Deaf, playing a total of nine games. Mr. Eakin went on to coach OGSA teams for many years. In 1983, he formed *The Olathe Express*; his three oldest daughters joined him. In 1986, he formed a 12-and-under team—

The Kansas City Peppers. His youngest daughter played for them. For a while, he was coaching both teams. He still keeps up with OGSA activities, and is its current president, although he no longer coaches. At its peak, the league boasted 125 teams. Participation has declined in recent years, due to some teams choosing tournaments over league play. Mr. Eakin calculates that OGSA will field at least 80 teams in 2024. He says that other Metro leagues have been competing with OGSA for players and teams. He also cites the growing popularity of other girl's sports—particularly

volleyball and soccer. Even though Mr. Eakin admits that he didn't know a lot about the rules of girl's softball, he was willing to take the challenge. He had played a lot of baseball—right on into college—and loves the game. He had reservations, though. He says that softball is not necessarily a natural sport for girls. The pace can be slow, unlike basketball or soccer. And his coaching style was unconventional.

"My voice really carries," he says with a shrug. "Everyone thought I was yelling at them. I was merely offering verbal encouragement." He adds that he wasn't coaching his

players any differently than he would have coached boys. And the parents could see that the girls were responding positively to his coaching.
"Plus, we were winning," he says with

That first year was everyone's rookie season. The next year, a few more players joined the team, and everyone got better. In 1981, their third year, they won 39 games, with only one loss against teams from both Kansas and Missouri. They were invited to—and won—a tournament in Memphis, Tennessee. Also in 1981, Mr. Eakin organized a pitching clinic at Olathe Vocational School. In that first clinic, he introduced windmill fast pitch to the players. Good pitchers

have been clocked at 65 miles per hour. The clinic was held for 30 years. Mr. Eakin knows the value of good pitching, and notes that teams are often built around the pitcher.

"Word got around," he says. "Others saw what we had accomplished. We had tryouts—even started recruiting."

Above all, Coach Eakin wanted to be fair to the players. He says that the better ones got to play a lot, but even the weaker players got a chance to get in the game. Nobody sat on the bench all the

team," he says matter-of-factly, "you were good enough to play."

As the seasons passed, and Mr. Eakin stepped away from coaching in 2019. He says that recruiting got even more aggressive, and he couldn't get the pitchers that he was looking for. Plus, other programs were recruiting players, starting in sixth grade.

Dan Eakin misses coaching. He became attached to team members—and their parents. His players from 30 years ago call to chat. A few weekends ago, he met with former players and parents. The girls he had coached would go on to graduate from college; many had played some level of college softball. And they had started careers and families of their

Girl's softball in Olathe has come a long way in the last fifty-plus years—in spite of a rough start. From two daytime-only fields to a state-of-the-art seven-field complex, OGSA has grown-and flourished—in Olathe, through leadership from people who volunteer; who sit on the OGSA Board of Directors; and from the City of Olathe. They have made this dream come true. The Olathe Daily News once dubbed Dan Eakin, "The Godfather of Girl's Softball." But his most important legacy has been to help shape young lives. Good job, Coach—

As we sat and tried to watch the event unfold, Mom had great difficulty because of her extreme light sensitivity. It physically hurts for her to be in

the sunshine with her eyes open. My thought about this particular day was that it would be much less bright the whole time we were out, so not too bad for her. Turned out I was wrong, but when the eclipse was total, she was able to remove her glasses and hat and look up in wonder with me. We were gobsmacked! Afterwards Mom said: That was a very beautiful thing.'

As the sun peeked back out, she told me a story about an eclipse experience in her childhood. There was a neighbor that had all kinds of equipment with which to view it and she was able to see it then, too. This would have been back in the

1940's, so finding ways to safely view it took more thought than where to buy a pair of eclipse glasses. Our common experience and her story has marked my heart. That she still has a sense of wonder and awe at the forces of nature gives me hope that I, too, will be appreciative of the world around me in my very late life. Happy Viewing!







Pistol Pete Marovich

Pistol". I bought his books and instructional tapes, watched his movie 'The Pistol' many times, wore his number 7 and saw him play. I wanted to be like Pete, play like Pete and even look like Pete, floppy socks

It all started in the winter of 1968. My folks lived outside the small town of Gideon, deep in the bootheel of Missouri on the fringes of SEC territory. TV reception was bad, no cable then and only three channels. I was on the roof of our old two story house turning the antenna. Down below my Dad was at the television and my brother Roger at the window. When the LSU game came in good I got the relay "That's good!" We were all glued to the set watching Pistol Pete. It was like basketball you had never seen before, so surreal!

Pete got his nickname as a 5'2", 90 pound 8th grader playing on the high school varsity. A reporter seeing him shoot the ball off his hips like a gunslinger called him 'Pistol Pete' and the legend was born. His dad Press, a former pro and college coach, got his wish in a boy when Pete was born in June of 1947. Seeing the baby for the first time he hollered at the nurses "look at those hands and feet, the kid's got it!" Press already saw basketball greatness writ-

ten all over little Pete.
Wasting no time Press would shoot baskets in front Wasting no time Press would shoot baskets in front of him hoping to fuel a hunger and passion for the game that he had. Seeds were planted and by the time he was four Pete had his dad's passion and by the age of seven his dad's dream. Pete would later say he was a human basketball, an android programmed to play basketball. Growing up Pete always had a basketball in his hand. He dribbled the two miles to and from town even while riding his bike.

His dad put him in the car with his head out the window teaching him to control his dribble at different speeds. He shot, dribbled and would spin the ball on his fingers until they were raw and bleeding. Press gave Pete a set of drills called *Homework Basket-ball*. Pete worked for hours perfecting these drills and when he got bored he made up his own drills.

He slept with a basketball until he was 13 repeating the mantra his dad taught him "fingertip control, backspin, fol-

mantra his dad taught him "fingertip control, backspin, follow through". With thousands of hours of practice by the time he was in high school Pete was a basketball wizard. He electrified crowds who flocked to watch him play at home and away, amazed at a style of basketball they had never seen before. After Pete's graduation Press got a job as head coach at LSU and Pete followed, a package deal.

Again Pete filled the arenas getting standing ovations wherever he played. The officials had difficulty following his play. Pete would come down the court on a fast break, wave his hand over the ball and tip it in the opposite direction, a disappearing ball trick. He'd get called for traveling prompting

He went over 50 points 28 times and 60 points 4 times, and that with double and triple coverage most of the time. He is regarded by many as the best college basketball player of all time.

In 1970 Pete was drafted by the *Atlanta* Hawks for 1.9 million, at that time the richest contract in sports history. At 6'5" and over 200 pounds Pete was excited about pro ball. I remember watching his first game. Pete came off the bench, quickly stole a pass, hit a jumper and minutes later scored on a fast break. But he struggled in his first few years with the Hawks.

Players were jealous of his star status
and contract, and unaccustomed to his

and contract, and unaccustomed to his style of play. Yet in his four years with the Hawks Pete made the All Star team and averaged over 26 points. In 1974 Pete was traded to the *New Orleans Jazz*. Coming 'home' his career blossomed. In his tenth season Pete led the the league in scoring and went for 69 points against the **Knicks** and the best defender in the league, Walt Frazier Pete had now achieved his dream Frazier. Pete had now achieved his dream as the best player in basketball, and nobody could stop him.

But just as the playoffs were about to begin Pete hurt his knee. The ever showman never missing an opportunity to entertain, Pete on a fast break at half court went up in the air, through a pass behind his back and under his legs and over a defender to a teammate under the basket for a lay-up. The crowd went wild, but Pete went down injuring his knee. Having to wear a cumbersome knee brace he was never the same after that. Hoping for the championship that ever eluded him, Pete went to the **Boston Celtics** in 1979.

Living in Colby I went with some friends to watch him play the Nuggets in Denver in early 1980. Pete came out before the game and put on his Showtime act for the fans. He put on an exhibition of dribbling, trick shots, and spinning the ball on his fingers, off his knee and onto his head into the basket. One of the guys I was with was from Boston and basketball coach at Colby High. When Pete went to sit down after his performance my friend had the

audacity to walk onto the court, shake hands and say a few words to Pete. Security immediately escorted him off the court and out of the arena. Needless to say he got his reward but missed the game. Boston would go on to lose in the playoffs to Philadelphia.

The following year Boston won the championship but Pete did not come back. He retired saying it was no longer fun and did not want a championship playing as a sub. Pete was an NBA All Star five times, on the all NBA team four times and scored over 16,000 points. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1987. The Hall of Fame states Pete as "probably the great-est creative offensive player in basketball history and the greatest ball handler of all time"

After retirement Pete said he was never happy playing college or professional, felling it was something he was just born to do. He struggled with all the hype and pressure. He had developed a drinking problem in college to numb the emptiness he felt. He lost his mother to suicide and prover get ever not heart there for her Sha never got over not being there for her. She had dealt with depression and loneliness partly due to Press and Pete always being

away and performing.

The two years after retiring Pete went into a deep depression and contemplated suicide. One night in 1983 he was very troubled and could not sleep. At one point he woke up covered in sweat and heard the voice of God, "Be strong and lift up your heart". After that Pete was a totally changed person happy and at peace for the first time in his life.

He traveled the country doing clinics for youth teaching his Homework Basketball and sharing Christ. He signed autographs with *Philippians 4:13* under his name. He visited prisons and inmates on death row, schools and hospitals, sharing his faith. His wife Jackie, who was not a believer saw the change in Pete and became liever saw the change in Pete and became a Christian

She said he once bought 200 to 300 turkeys and hand delivered them at Christmas. Pete also led his dad to Christ and they traveled to Israel teaching coaches basketball fundamentals and strategy. Pete was an exceptional speaker always being asked to share his testimony, even did so at a Billy Graham Crusade in 1987.

Dr. James Dobson of Focus on the Family invited Pete to Pasadena for an interview on his Christian radio program. In the middle of a friendly pickup game in a Nazarene church with Dr Dobson he asked Pete how he felt. Pete said "I feel great"then seconds later collapsed and died. Autopsy showed he was born miss-ing his left coronary artery. Doctors said it was a miracle he had lived past 20. Pete died in the only two places he had found

peace, a gym and a church. I have a large picture of Pete, when he was with the Jazz hanging on the wall by the door entering my gym. I often ask who the picture is. Seldom will a young adult know, and it is very rare that a youth will know that it is **Pistol Pete**. Pete said in a testimony the year before he died that in time his name, his accomplishments and all his trophies will be forgotten and only dust. It has only been a little over 40 years since Pete wore that number 7 on the *Jazz* and he is already largely forgot-ten. His basketball records will be forgotten or broken too. But the many lives he touched for Christ will live on forever.



Cream of Fiddlehead Soup

1 ½ c. fiddleheads, cleaned and finely chopped

- OR Asparagus!
- 2 tablespoons butter 2 cubes chicken bouillon
- small onion, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced 2 cups milk

2 cups heavy cream
2 cups heavy cream
Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
Steam the fiddleheads for 10 to 12 minutes or until tender. Set aside. In a saucepan, melt the butter and bouillon cubes over medium heat. Add the fiddleheads, onions, and garlic, and cook for 10 minutes. Add the milk, stir frequently, and heat thoroughly. Add the cream, stir to incorporate, and season with salt and pepper. Serve steaming hot.

Bit of History about Desoto

De Soto became a boom town after it was announced in March 1942 that the Sunflower Ordnance Works would be built south of the town. Traffic on the town's main street, which was Kansas Highway 10 at the time, was said to be bumper-to-bumper for two hours at shift changes at the plant. With housing hard to find, workers at what was then called the Sunflower Ordnance Works lived in trailers in a De Soto church yard, or tents throughout the town. More than 10,000 people were employed in the construction of the plant and 12,000 worked there during its peak wartime production. Pan a Sonic is now building at the same location and will employee 4,000 people and Housing and Apartments are being build everywhere.






